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### A Legacy of Hope: Vernon Oakes



For nearly four decades, Vernon Oakes has been a leader, advocate, and friend to Community of Hope. We proudly honor him as the 2025 recipient of the Tom Nees Award for Exceptional Service, recognizing his extraordinary commitment to our mission.

Vernon first became involved in 1986 when his Stanford alumni consulting

team helped shape our strategic plan. In 1987, at the invitation of our founder Tom Nees, he joined the Board of Directors, serving with distinction for 18 years. In 2000, Vernon stepped in as Interim Executive Director, guiding the organization through a leadership transition. He was instrumental in opening the Girard Street location, and in donating and opening Hope Apartments, our first location in DC's Ward 8.

"When I came to Community of Hope, I wanted to help one family," says Vernon. "Through the years, I rejoice that many people have been given hope." He explains, "I often say, 'but for the grace of God'. While I was on the board, I discovered that one of my nieces, along with her five children, was staying in the Community of Hope shelter. It struck me deeply, because I knew what it was like to grow up working poor—living paycheck to paycheck, with more month than money. I realized I could have easily been in the same situation." That empathy and connection have carried through all of Vernon's service.

He has not only helped Community of Hope grow—he has also entrusted us with his own health. Just last year, our medical team identified a heart issue and ensured he received life-saving care.

Beyond Community of Hope, Vernon has advanced cooperative education and housing justice across DC. In 2014, he launched Everything Co-op, a radio show that amplifies leaders building stronger communities. He connects that work back to Community of Hope, recognizing that both provide stability and hope.

Vernon credits his mother and grandfather for instilling the values of education and community, which he has carried forward. Today he brings the same curiosity and care to his personal life that he applies to his work. He enjoys visiting his children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren, as well as dancing, riding his motorcycle, traveling, and practicing hot yoga.

Community of Hope appreciates Vernon's decades of service and his consistent vision for what's achievable when people come together.

This award, given in memory of our founder, Tom Nees, recognizes its recipient for their long-standing, deeply impactful service to the people who turn to Community of Hope for help. Since 2015, the organization has recognized twelve recipients for their service and impact.

#### **Back to School Gratitude**

The 13th Annual Bellevue Back to School Bash was a joyful success! Co-hosted with the Bellevue Neighborhood Library and DC Fire and EMS, this Ward 8 tradition brought more than 1,700 neighbors together to celebrate the new school year. More than 1,200 backpacks filled with school supplies went to students from pre-K3 through 12th grade, and we gave away many more to families in housing, wellchild visits, and resource connections. Families enjoyed live music, story time with local illustrator, petting zoo, raffle prizes, community resources, and more. #### Girard Street: Back to Family Shelter

Girard will transition back to a family shelter in December 2025, returning to its roots of serving families in need. For 33 years, the Girard Street site has been a cornerstone of Community of Hope's mission — making it our longest-running location in our 45-year history. Since opening in 1992, Girard has provided shelter and support to more than 500 families and, through its more recent Bridge Housing Program, helped over 220 individuals experiencing homelessness on a path toward stability and independence. This next chapter builds on decades of impact, ensuring that Girard continues to be a place where District families find safety, stability, and a path to a long-term home.

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
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# From Stranded to Strengthened



Mr. Eugene and Ebony have built a long-lasting bond.

What began as a celebratory trip quickly became a fight for survival. Ebony planned a weeklong vacation that turned into her being stranded for two months when Hurricane Dorian hit the Bahamas during her stay in 2019. "I was planning to celebrate a major milestone, but had no clue that a storm was coming," says Ebony. Once the storm hit, planes were grounded and her savings for the trip quickly dwindled leaving her stranded physically and financially.

"It was a fight to get back, but it took volunteer doctors from FEMA to help me get back home," says Ebony.

When Ebony returned to D.C, life looked nothing like she expected. She had spent two months navigating danger and uncertainty. By then, she had lost her footing—no stable housing, little to no nearby family support, and mounting anxiety after such an ordeal.

"I made getting stable my full-time job," she says. "I went to the library every day. "I had an aunt that let me crash at her house while I started to rebuild."

One day at local farmer's market, a stranger overheard Ebony talking about food and transportation challenges and said, "You need to meet Eugene." That led Ebony to the Bellevue Family Success Center (FSC) where she found exactly what she'd been searching for: people who listened, responded, and followed up.

Over the past two years, Ebony has built steady relationships with the Bellevue FSC team—especially Eugene and LaToya—who became her bridge to practical help and peace of mind. "Sometimes your mind is overwhelmed," Ebony explains. "Just having someone patient who says, 'We don't know, but hold on—we'll look it up,' makes all the difference."

At Bellevue FSC, Ebony received direct connection to resources, quick calls to check in, and thoughtful referrals. Staff helped Ebony navigate her health insurance, secure a dental referral, and connect to emotional wellness resources as she healed.

Today, Ebony's calm confidence tells the story of her own resilience—and how far hope has carried her. She recently received a permanent housing voucher, is working toward her diploma, and plans to launch a nonprofit to fill community gaps.

"People don't understand how hard it can be to just get a meal or sustain yourself as you go through this type of trauma," says Ebony.



#### Health & Wellness

In 1977, nurse Lois Smith (now Wagner) launched the health services in a single exam room. Health now offers medical, dental, emotional wellness and patient support to about 16,000 patients through community health centers, telehealth, and home-based care.

#### Housing & Stability
